## **COLLABORATION**

## How was, Remember the water that runs through the valley, written?

After each student wrote a *Remember* poem, they chose lines to fit together into a group poem. The writers decided who would read which lines. The whole group spoke the **bolded lines** together, **in unison** (speaking together at the same time).

## With your group:

- **Highlight or** <u>underline</u> words that are **repeated** in the poem, *Remember the water....* 
  - \*Repetition creates rhythm and meaning in poetry. It stays in reader or listener's mind.

#### **GROUP WRITE - first draft**

- Choose a scribe to keep track of your group poem progress.
- **SHARE** which lines from your *Remember* poem you want to include in the group poem.
- Fit everyone's lines together like a **puzzle**, (at least 2 lines each).
- Discuss which line or lines could be **repeated** to express a main idea or feeling.

#### **GROUP WRITE - final draft**

- Complete weaving your group poem together.
- Decide who is going to read which lines. The entire group recites the repeated lines in UNISON.
- PRACTICE reading ALOUD as a GROUP. (Memorizing is not necessary. Reading your lines from a written draft is fine).
- \*PRESENT to the class. (some may only wish to read the UNISON parts)
